Alumni Corporation Assesses Future Housing Needs

In the spring edition of *From the Heart*, I mentioned our desire to hire a professional property management company. I'm pleased to announce that the Indiana Alpha Chapter of Sigma Phi Epsilon Alumni Corporation has entered into a facility management agreement with Executive Outcomes, a company specializing in fraternity and sorority housing.

Over the past six months, we've incurred more than \$100,000 in capital expenses and deferred maintenance. Capital repairs included new flooring in the corridors, fencing around the bum room exterior window well, which is a life safety concern, and installation of a new high-efficiency water heater.

The deferred maintenance list is unfortunately a bit longer, but we made many necessary updates:

- Comprehensive IT maintenance and upgrades
- Removing the old fire escape
- Repairing all shower units and toilets to working condition
- Purchasing new mattresses
- Painting the common areas
- · Replacing missing small wares in the kitchen
- Repairing the kitchen ice maker, refrigerator, and oven
- Replacing fire extinguishers
- Repairing fire doors, upgrading lift safety egress signage, and many other small deferred maintenance items

As we move forward with Executive Outcomes, the alumni board is committed to keeping the chapter house safe and functionally maintained. With our membership numbers strong and the brothers fulfilling their obligations to live in the chapter house, we should have adequate funds to start chipping away at some more noteworthy projects than what's listed previously.

If anyone has comments or ideas about the physical structure, please contact me. We appreciate your feedback.

hose alumni who lived at SigEp from 1992 through 2001 will fondly remember Mom Nonnie (Nonnie Cameron-Owens) as their housemother. "I didn't cook and I wasn't the housekeeper...just the 'mom," says Nonnie. She returned to this year's Homecoming only to learn that what was once her room, complete with flowered curtains and other feminine touches, has since been taken over by Chapter President Mitchell Baye '13. These days, Mom Nonnie is happily married to Bruce Owens and living in Punta Gorda, Florida.

Mom Nonnie recalls, with a big smile, "I loved being the housemother here." She reminisces, "It has been so wonderful to watch the brothers grow up and now they're fathers, husbands, members of the community... doing good." Mom Nonnie adds, "Some of them have even apologized for being idiots back then." Nonnie also remembers Nationals requesting "gentlemanly behavior" be included in the house agenda.

According to Nonnie, to be a housemother "you have to be cut out of a different cloth. It's not easy living in 'Testosterone Valley.' I never had children. This is the way the Lord has blessed me with children. It takes a lot of patience and understanding." When she was housemother, she lived by the philosophy "Let them be who they are but give them guidance and understanding. Be fair."

Brothers who lived under Nonnie's guidance for nine years still keep in contact with her through Facebook. She says, "I now get feedback. When they get a good job, they thank me. Back then, I would stand on a chair and give them a tip-of-the-day every day." Nonnie also taught the brothers the finer points of etiquette. She adds, "As they have gotten older, they have come to realize and appreciate that I was here."

She was always available to lend an ear when brothers wanted to talk about breaking up with their girlfriends. "They could talk comfortably to me. I mentored them, listened, and helped them get through the pain." Obviously, Nonnie was very successful counseling the brothers, as she attended 23 weddings in 1999 alone. The brothers also looked to Nonnie to read and edit their papers for class.

Nonnie humbly downplays her role when she says, "I was just the mom," though she planned special dinners and taught the brothers the finer points of etiquette along the way. She understands the brothers when she says, "While living in the house, they're going through a transitional time in their lives—from being dependent on their parents to being on their own." Nonnie loves seeing how well the chapter is doing now.

SIGEPS WALK MEMORY LANE AT HOMECOMING

hanks to Karen Wilczewski, friend of SigEp, brothers who visited ■ Indiana Alpha during Homecoming had the opportunity to share their favorite memories for this issue of From the Heart.

Norm Nabhan '71 recalls a carbide cannon being set off one afternoon during a football game at the same time a police car came around the corner. "It sounded like a bomb," Norm comments, adding, "We were on the front lawn watching the police handcuff a student. They took him to the police station and released him shortly after they discovered it wasn't a bomb." Norm also remembers a classic phone prank being played on new members. New members on phone duty would have to deliver messages to brothers in their rooms. In this instance, this message needed to be delivered to Room 9. Only after an extensive search of the second floor, did he discover there wasn't a Room 9.

Norm has been involved with SigEp for the last 40 years, including serving as its national president about 10 years ago. Reflecting on his time with the fraternity, Norm says, "They were a great group of guys." He traveled to this year's Homecoming from Houston, Texas, adding, "When they say 'friends for life,' this is what this place is about."

Dave Woods '71 wasn't the first in his family to pledge SigEp. His grandfather, Ford Woods, class of 1910, lived in the house before the current facility on Waldron Street. Dave recalls his pledge class making a road trip to Ohio State University for a walkout. At the time, Purdue beat Ohio State 41-6. According to Dave, this was during the Woody Hayes-Jack Mollenkopf days, when his pledge class left a cow in the kitchen of the fraternity house. He adds that it was a "nice touch."

Pat Gantert '72 remembers serving as chapter president and how John Fox '71 was in charge of the kitchen. John's official title was steward. Pat also remembers the house having a full-time cook, Ike Rogers. Pat recounts Wally Brant '71 returning to SigEp with three snakes in hand after spending a summer in Arizona. Wally kept the snakes in his room and whenever a new member visited Wally's room to do a wake-up call, the new member never knew if the snakes would be in their cage or if he would encounter them face to face. Pat recalls 93 brothers living at SigEp at the time.

Jim Cassell '73 and Tim Hoestermann '73 have fond memories of performances by Tina and the Tune Benders. It was the late '60s and early '70s, when the fashion trend for men was bell-bottom trousers, platform shoes, and three-piece suits. Jim recalls one time when Tina and the Tune Benders, who specialized in "sha-na-na" music, were invited to perform on campus prior to an outdoor concert. The group introduced themselves to the crowd by throwing a hubcap on the floor, then going into their singing routine.

One of the antics Jim and Tim admit to, now that they're alumni, is taking a fire extinguisher, filling it with water, and squirting brothers in the house. The police came and took the fire extinguisher away. Also, both were known for nicknaming some of the brothers in the house. For example, they gave Kenn Reynolds '71 the nickname Pickle. Jim traveled to this year's Homecoming from North Webster, Indiana, while Tim journeyed from St. Louis, Missouri.



Tribute to Cancer Survivo Keith Morkel '72

"There is just no substitute for old friends," Dale Roberts '72 shared in an e-mail to Keith Morkel '72. The message was sent following a September reunion between Dale, Keith, and David "Rupert" Strong '73. The friends got together in Cincinnati for their first face-to-face reunion in more than 40 years.

They reminisced about bonanza cube steak, bread-on-bread sandwiches, and the secret handshake. Rupert told stories of the road trip to Put-in-Bay, with a detour to Mansfield, Ohio, in hopes of seeing



a "Keith Morkel Was Here" sign, and how Keith taught a fraternity brother a lesson using a pizza box and turntable. Keith's favorite Purdue memories include the snowball fights between SigEp and Cary Quad, evenings at Harry's Chocolate Shop, attending World Campus Afloat in 1972, and playing football for Purdue.

Along with the stories shared, so was support for Keith who was diagnosed with B-cell prolymphocytic leukemia in June. This form of leukemia is a rare, chronic, and aggressive type of leukemia. Amazingly after 12 straight weeks of chemotherapy at The James Medical Center in Columbus, Ohio, Keith was given the great news that his cancer was in remission. Given the aggressive nature of this disease, Keith received a bone marrow transplant in October, in hopes for a solid and cancer-free recovery.

Keith's family and friends say that in spite of these medical trials, his positive attitude and smile have carried on. He is an avid Purdue and Cleveland sports fan, likes to play golf, watch movies, and collect antiques, and loves spending time with his family. He keeps in touch with Rupert and Dale, as well as Rex Brown '73, Jim Cassell '73, John Means '73, Dave Strother '71, and blood brother Kevin Morkel '74.

Keith retired in 2009 after more than 35 years with NCR, Compaq, and HP, specializing in sales and partner alliance management. He has three children: Ben '05, Rachel, and Annie, and resides in Kettering, Ohio, with his dog, Petie, a namesake of Purdue Pete.
