Our latest, and we believe final, timeline has us cutting the ribbon on a renewed 690 Waldron in fall 2024, filling it with our own, newest SigEp brothers.

In these pages, you will hear more from my colleagues on the amazing progress they are making in each of these respective areas. Recruitment, which struggled to take off for several semesters, seems to be getting the wind in its sails.

The facilities team is deeply involved in detailed discussions with our general contracting firm, preparing to ask the architect for detailed drawings. They are looking for every opportunity to make the project more cost efficient and deliver the very best housing and community facility on campus.

The fundraising team is adding to their totals board by growing both the number of donors and the volume of gifts accumulated for our goals. You can look forward to naming opportunities in the renovated house and challenge gifts that, we hope, will inspire a broader group of donors.

At the heart of these accomplishments is a dedicated team of volunteers. Their dedication and hard work are something you all can be proud of—I know I am.

As for the board members, Director **Daryl Martz '76** is stepping down—but still helping—to make room for **Jim Quinn '83**. The rest of your board reupped for another year of service. We are grateful to all of them.

WELCOMING SIGEP HOME BY FALL 2024

Construction Plans Are Instated for 690 Waldron

While the onset of COVID-19 certainly changed the schedule for the renovation committee, it has afforded us the blessing to recruit more brothers, increase our fundraising, and shore up our construction planning. As you may be aware, Kappa Delta Sorority has been leasing 690 Waldron for the last several years and had planned to start construction on their own new house when the pandemic also caused a delay in their plans. This delay enabled us to negotiate a one-year lease extension on favorable terms to the SigEps and has provided Sigma Phi Epsilon a huge benefit. The extra year of rent not only gave us one extra year of income, but also more time to complete our many remaining tasks. The sorority will vacate the house in May of 2023, and construction will be completed in time for the 2024 fall semester.

At this point, we have commissioned a local architect, Scholer Associates, who has prepared preliminary drawings of our new home. The fraternity features sleeping rooms for 41 brothers and one full-time house director. Every wall in our sleeping areas will be demolished and rebuilt from the studs out. One of the most exciting features will be a classroom on the lower level, which can provide for actual Purdue classes as well as chapter and campus organization meetings. The modernization will also feature a four-story elevator, new windows, fire sprinklers, air conditioning, and an electronic security and access control system.

As Indiana Alpha reestablishes itself on campus, Tim and Terry are passionate about the active members and future brothers reaping the rewards of the program. When Tim and Terry were asked about serving as Indiana Alpha's general contractors for the renovation at 690 Waldron, they didn't have to think twice about building a chapter house for balanced men.

"It is extremely rewarding to be involved in the rebirth of the fraternity and to assist with upgrading the facilities," Terry said. "We're committed to making SigEp a leading organization on campus again. While we all have great memories of the house as it was when we were there, it will be especially gratifying to help in the transformation to make it better than ever."

Tim and Terry serve as president and secretary/treasurer, respectively, of Larson-Danielson Construction Co. They've felt blessed to be leaders of their family's business, which has grown to be one of the strongest construction firms in the Midwest during its 100-plus-year history.

reetings and salutations from 690 Waldron! I know we are all looking I forward to hearing that again. We are excited to report that we are progressing on all fronts toward renovating and returning to 690 Waldron.

The success of Indiana Alpha relies on three areas: recruiting brothers, renovating 690 Waldron, and fundraising. We recently completed our Indiana Alpha annual meeting at Homecoming. This meeting is preceded by an alumni dinner at Mountain Jacks with all our new brothers. All in attendance would agree this was a very impressive group of young men. Despite some of the lingering COVID-19 challenges, recruitment has reached a level of normalcy and is in full swing.

In this newsletter, we have provided a renovation update. The delay of one year is not a path we would have chosen, but given the well-publicized challenges with the global supply chain and constrained construction resources, it is the right decision and in no way changes our goal.

We are pleased to announce that fundraising is going very well. We currently have donations of \$1,691,288 and are well on the way to achieving our first-level goal of \$1.75M. We are also committed to stretch our goal to \$2M, which would give us additional flexibility in meeting our renovation objectives. Our goal is to achieve donations from 20% of active alumni (1,500), or 300 donations. Currently, 172 brothers have donated, and we certainly have room to grow that number. Achieving our donor goal would guarantee achievement of the \$2M goal. Many thanks to the brothers who have donated to date.

As the architectural aspects of the 690 Waldon renovation are defined, we would like to introduce naming rights as part of the capital campaign

incentives. We have defined donation values for the various areas of the house, e.g., rooms, veranda, great room. Individual alumni donors can secure their naming rights by achieving the donation level for that area. If a group, such as a pledge class, seeks to secure an area, the required donation value increases, given the potential of several brothers donating. A plaque will be provided for that area identifying the donors and the designation. Please visit purduesigep.org and click on "Capital Campaign" for donation levels and program guidelines.

We would also like to announce our first challenge gift. Mom Nonnie Owens, housemother from 1992-2001, heard about our campaign and graciously donated \$1,500. We are launching a challenge gift to the brothers who graduated from 1992-2004 to raise an incremental \$50,000 in order to designate the house director's suite in honor of Mom Nonnie. We have approximately 450 brothers during this time period, and we are seeking donations of \$1,000 or more to get to the \$50,000 goal. If you were a brother during Mom Nonnie's era, we hope that you will support this challenge and honor her commitment to Indiana



What Does Greek Life Look Like Moving Forward?

Associate Dean of Students Brandon Cutler Outlines Steps for Future Success

A surge of volunteers, an honest conversation about student well-being, and a plan to expand diversity: according to Director of Fraternity, Sorority, and Cooperative Life and Associate Dean of Students Brandon Cutler, that's how fraternities and sororities will maintain relevancy in the undergraduate experience.

The Greek life experience has changed since Brandon was in Theta Chi at Iowa State University in 2004. He recognizes the way the world has changed, the variation of communal backgrounds, and the hardships students face in the present day; but if there's one thing Brandon knows to be true, it's that Greek life is important.

"SigEp, as a national organization, has been a leader in the fraternity industry for decades. They look at the student experience from a holistic perspective. Enhancing social environments and membership development experiences are an asset we lean on to provide ultimate living and learning experiences."

Brandon believes that the future of Greek life relies on meeting outcomes-based objectives. Having more alumni volunteers to take on mentorship roles encourages students to understand their career aspirations; creating conversation about student well-being calls on higher education stakeholders to discuss financial insecurity and mental health; expanding diversity and inclusion creates a more vibrant, fulfilling student experience.

"Students need someone to challenge them; helping them get good grades or graduate on time is wonderful, but students need someone to guide them into their full potential," Brandon posits. He believes that each organization should have 30-40 volunteers to mentor students; the expertise, value, and companionship they provide to students in need of direction is invaluable.

When discussing student success, the conversation must center around the whole student. Universities and higher education partners should coordinate a plan that provides resources, direction, and potential solutions to students. At Purdue, financial affordability, mental health and well-being, and diversity and inclusion have become a clear focus. In fact, Purdue has frozen tuition for over 10 consecutive years under the leadership of President Daniels.

"Financial burdens can limit opportunities for students. It's important to consider living-andlearning models that offer unique housing options, including senior discounts, variable room rate, or compensation for facility leadership roles to help students graduate without a mountain of debt."

Brandon encourages students to take advantage of campus resources. In recent years, the conversation around mental health has increased, widening the opportunity for students to seek help or assurance if they need it. "Going to the counseling center is understood, by most students, as a positive resource, and it's something we really hope students will continue to utilize," Brandon added.

Brandon implores universities and higher education partners to strategize a plan to enhance the student-learning experience, learn from people with different backgrounds, and explore various cultures. Fraternities, sororities, and cooperatives members are 80 percent Caucasian, while the overall campus percentage is only 60. He asked, "How do we create a fraternity's living-and-learning environment to feel welcoming to students that come from diverse backgrounds if we're not considering their needs within the structure and strategy of our organizations?"

Ultimately, Greek life 10, 20, or 30 years from now is unpredictable. "I wish I had a crystal ball," Brandon added. The most effective plan for the University and higher education partners is to ask themselves what they want the future to look like and determine the most feasible way to get there. The first step to undergraduate success is ensuring that students' needs and desires are understood and acknowledged in action.
